The roundup will be issued every March, June, September and December. Those wishing to contribute should follow the below instructions, which apply to academics and practitioners. Submissions and any questions should be directed to Phillip Nelson. The **deadline** for submissions to the September Roundup is **Friday**, **4 September**.

Submissions are divided into two categories - 'research publications' and the 'practice of intervention, research and policy'. The first refers to any new theoretical or empirical academic study published within the last 3 months. The latter refers to publications, blogs, or other reports that may include pieces on research methods, and opinion pieces on the process of fieldwork, as well as project evaluations, etc.

Members should send a 200-word summary of the item, plus title and contact email for any responses. A link to an online resource is highly recommended.
