Timing your panel

The conference runs on UK summer time, and each session lasts 90 minutes.

We have placed four papers on most panels, and the rhythm we suggest gives every paper up to 20 minutes, split like this: keep your presentation to around 10 minutes, then leave at least 10 minutes for the conversation that follows – questions and comments from the audience and your fellow panelists.

If your panel has more than four papers, your Chair will divide the time evenly so everyone is allocated the same amount of time.

Panels are welcome to share discussant duties, with each presenter briefly responding to one other paper on the panel. This can spark dialogue and we hope you can take advantage of it.

If you are part of a pre-submitted panel or roundtable, you are free to shape and allocate your session however works best for your group.

Every panel has a Chair to keep things on time and gently move things along. They will also help gather and steer questions from the room.

Directions using the *bus*: Take the 4 or 4A bus from the bus stop next to the James McCune Smith Learning Hub and get off at St Vincent Street bus stop; there is a 7-minute walk from the St Vincent Street bus stop to the Glasgow City Chambers. The buses come every 20 minutes.
